Tending the Flock

A New Humanity

On this Second Sunday of Advent the Word of God acquires the moving tones of the socalled "Second Isaiah", who announced to the Israelites, tried by decades of bitter exile in Babylon, liberation at last: "Comfort, comfort my people", the Prophet says in God's name. "Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that her warfare is ended" (Is 40: 1-2). This is

what the Lord wishes to do in Advent: to speak to the heart of his people and through it to the whole of humanity, to proclaim salvation. Today too the Church raises her voice: "Make straight in the desert a highway for our God" (Is 40: 3). For the peoples worn out by poverty and hunger, for the hosts of refugees and for all who are suffering grave and systematic violations of their rights, the Church stations herself as a sentinel on the lofty mountain of faith and proclaims: "Behold your God! Behold, the Lord God comes with might" (Is 40: 10).

This prophetic announcement is fulfilled in Jesus Christ, who with his preaching and, later, with his death and Resurrection, brought the ancient promises to fulfillment, revealing an even deeper and more universal perspective. He inaugurated an exodus that was no longer solely earthly, in history, hence temporary, but rather radical and definitive: the transition from the kingdom of evil to the Kingdom of God, from the dominion of sin and death to that of love and life. Therefore, human hope goes beyond the legitimate expectations of social and political liberation because what Jesus began is a new humanity that comes "from God" but, at the same, time germinates on our earth, to the extent that it lets itself be fertilized by the Lord's Spirit. Thus it is a question of fully entering the logic of faith: believing in God, in his plan of salvation, and at the same time, striving to build his Kingdom. Justice and peace are in fact gifts of God, but require men and women to be the "good ground" ready to receive the good seed of his Word.

Our Reason To Rejoice

REFLECTION: The 3rd Sunday of Advent is known as "Gaudete Sunday" or "Joyful Sunday." This is the day when we rejoice in our faith and celebrate the joy of the coming Messiah, our Emmanuel – God with us. He comes amidst the darkness that surrounds us, darkness that permeates all levels of society and culture - senseless violence, international turmoil, immorality and perversion, not to mention the present pandemic that we are experiencing. But today, we are reminded that because of God's great love for humanity, He sent His only begotten Son as Light who will lead us out of darkness. As we are drawn into Christ's radiant light, He reveals not only our shortcoming but He lights our way to salvation. Knowing and accepting this truth is our reason to rejoice.

While we are in the middle of our Advent journey and to enrich our preparation, we should keep in mind the three comings of Jesus - His birth, His coming to us in our daily lives through various ways, and His glorious coming in the end times, and how they relate to one another. Our preparation to celebrate His birth is an occasion for deeper reflection.



It is so fulfilling to experience the power of the Incarnation that God became human in the person of Jesus because of His love for us. The deeper we contemplate on this mystery, the further we enter into the grace of "God with us." We then see clearly the connection of Christmas with Easter: all of this is for us, for our salvation, to free us from the power of sin and death.

As Christians, we are redeemed, sanctified and are called "children of light." The radiance of the Great Light who dwells in our hearts should shine to people around us. Jesus say, "Let your light shine before men, that they may see

Saint Lucy: Patron of the Blind

Born in Syracuse, Sicily in the year 283 to a noble family, Lucy was brought up a Christian by her mother Eutychia. Her name means "light" in Latin and is related to the word "lucid", which means "radiant, clear and understandable.

When her mother became very ill, Lucy helped her make a pilgrimage to the shrine of St. Agatha in Catania. As her mother obtained a miraculous cure at the shrine, St. Agatha appeared to Lucy telling her she would someday be a martyr for her faith.

Years later, a pagan man stirred by greed wanted to marry Lucy. But she had made a vow to remain a virgin and serve only God. She had also distributed a great part of her fortune to the poor. The man was furious at her refusal and he denounced her as a Christian before Paschasius, the governor of Sicily, who then sent soldiers to kill her. But when they tried to move her, they could not do so. They harnessed her to bulls but she stood immovable. They covered her in oil and started a fire but it did not burn her. Her eyes were torn out but still she refused to abandon her faith. Finally, they stabbed her death, as the vision of St. Agatha had predicted. Before she died her sight was miraculously restored.

Lucy is a favorite saint of many around the world. In Sweden her feast day of December 13 is one of the shortest days of the year in the middle of winter. The Swedes celebrate this change of season with a Festival of Light. On this day the youngest daughter dresses in white and wears a crown of lit candles. She wakes the rest of the family with coffee, rolls and a special song. In other European countries young girls walk through the neighborhood holding candles and singing carols.

The name of St. Lucy is mentioned in the prayer "nobis quoque peccatoribus" in the Canon of the Mass, one of only eight women to be so honored.

your good deeds and praise your Father in Heaven," (Mt 5:16). Thus, our community theme for the week tells us: We prepare for Christ's coming when we testify that Jesus is our Light and Salvation. We cannot witness for Christ if we do not have His spirit in us that leads us to know Him intimately and experience His love.

Testifying for Christ means telling others what we have personally seen and experienced in our Lord Jesus. We can be like Philip; as soon as he met the Lord, he excitedly told Nathaniel about Him. Witnessing does not require a special training. Believing in and receiving Jesus qualifies anyone to be His witness. All we do is tell our personal story of redemption – how we were burdened with sin and guilt, how we received Jesus and were cleansed and forgiven by Him. We can share how Jesus, after touching our heart and opening our eyes, gave us true freedom and peace. We can tell them how we always find ourselves in His presence whenever we turn to Him in our emptiness and despair.

It is never too late to start witnessing for Christ. We can consecrate ourselves anew and begin to speak for Christ. We may experience challenges of persecution and frustration along the way, but we can always unite our sacrifices and sufferings with His mission. We have to be steadfast and faithful herald who lead people to Jesus, our Light and Salvation. For Jesus promises us, that "He has mercy on those who fear him in every generation," (Lk 1:49-50).

Blessed Among Women

REFLECTION: God's best servants are often ordinary people. Joseph and Mary, chosen to be the mother and foster father of the Messiah, were ordinary people from a small town called Nazareth. Mary was a young woman of humble origins, typical of the people of her day, and seemingly too insignificant for such an important task as becoming the mother of God. But God chose Mary for one of the

most important acts of obedience He has ever demanded of anyone. Often, we may feel that our situation in life makes us unlikely candidates for God's service, but we must not limit God's choice because He can use us if we trust in Him.

God's plan involved extraordinary events in the lives of ordinary people. Until St. Gabriel's visit, Mary's life was going about well as she could hope. She had recently become engaged to a local carpenter, Joseph, and was anticipating married life. But Mary's life was about to change forever. God's blessing does not automatically bring instant success, fame or favor. His blessing on Mary, the honor



of being the mother of the Messiah, would lead to much pain; her peers would ridicule her; her fiancé would come close to leaving her: her Son would be rejected and murdered. But through her Son would come hope for the world. This is why Mary is praised by countless generations as "blessed among women." Her submission led to mankind's salvation. When our blessings lead to sorrow,

think of Mary and wait patiently for God to finish working out His plan for us.

Our character is revealed by our response to the unexpected. Mary is greatly troubled by the angel's words and wonders what the greeting implied. "Hail, full of grace! The Lord is with you." Why am I favored? But the angel gives an answer with further explanation. "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. Behold you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, you shall name him Jesus. He will be great and will be called Son of the Most High..." (Lk

1:28-32). Mary was very much aware that in Israel at that time, everyone was awaiting the coming of the Messiah and she had no doubts about the truth of the angel's proclamation. However, her next question was very relevant. "How can this be since I do not know man?" (Lk 1:34). After all, faith must also be reasonable, and not blind. So we ask questions to enlighten our minds. And the angel continues to explain that "the Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you," (Lk 1:35).

The birth of Jesus to a virgin is a miracle that many unbelievers find difficult to accept. However, Luke holds this virgin birth to be true. Firstly, Luke was a medical doctor and he knew how babies are made. It would have been as hard for him to believe in a virgin birth, as it is with many contemporary scoffers. And vet he reported it as fact. Secondly, Luke was a painstaking researcher who based his Gospel on eyewitness account. Traditions hold that he talked with Mary about the events in the first two Chapters of his book. This is her story, not a fictional invention. And, thirdly, Christians and Jews,

who worship God as Creator of the universe have no doubt that He can create a child in a virgin's womb, if He so chooses, "for nothing will be impossible for God," (Lk 1:37).

Mary's answer was a wholehearted "Yes" and her humble response was: "I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your Word," (Lk 1:38). With her consent she made the mystery of the Incarnation possible. Thus God's promise is true for all of us today, "I will be a father to him, and he shall be a son to me" (2 Sam 7:14A).
